Reflection on the reading

How good is your hearing? Maybe you can hear well? Maybe you wear hearing aids which means that you can hear well? Or maybe, as you've become more mature in years you feel that your hearing is not so good, even with some extra help. In later life, my dad struggled with his hearing and needed to wear hearing aids. He didn't find it easy to wear them and, at times, he found that lots of noise and chatter could become quite distorted. So much so, that at family get-togethers when the four young boy grandchildren were in attendance, my dad would ceremonially take out both hearing aids and lay them on the table because the noise in the house would be a bit too much for him! On a more serious note, I know that a common problem for those with hearing difficulties is the amount of background noise that might be going on when trying to focus on an individual conversation or voice.

This year the Methodist Church's Christmas campaign has been called 'Hush the Noise'. A phrase which is at the end of the carol we sang at the start of our service. The following explanation says: 'Christmas is loud, isn't it? So much expectation. So many voices. Telling us how to celebrate, what to wear, what to eat and drink, what to watch and what to buy. Instead, this Christmas we're inviting everyone to hush the noise. To listen for the love song that the angels bring, this and every year. They sang it for the first time more than 2,000 years ago, on the midnight clear. They're just waiting for us to join in.'

As we reflect on the Christmas story and the visit of the shepherds to the Christchild, they are examples of how to hear the 'love song the angels bring'. In many ways their lifestyle is materially poor but time rich. Out on the hillside in the quiet of the night they were in a place where they were able to hear the angel's message (frightening though it was at first!) and respond to the prompting to go and find the baby Jesus. They were not disappointed, and they shared their joy with others. Mary is also another example of how to ponder on the things of God amidst the noise of the situation she found herself in.

So as 2024 draws to a close and 2025 begins, may we take the message of the good news of Christmas into the new year. May we continue to find time, long after the Christmas decorations have been put away and all the turkey eaten, to hush the noise that is all around us and spend time in the presence of God listening and hearing the message that God wants to bring to us where we are. I wish you all a happy and peaceful new year.
